

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Hello church...

I want to share a story with you that I read recently. It communicates a poignant message that keeps occupying my thoughts. I remember learning a song when I was a kid that posed the question, "Do You Know, Oh Christian, You're a Sermon in Shoes?" Here's the story:

His name is Bill. He has wild hair wears a t-shirt with holes in it, jeans, and no shoes. This was literally his wardrobe for his entire four years of college. He is brilliant, kind of esoteric, and very, very bright. He became a Christian while attending college. Across the street from the campus is a well-dressed, very conservative church. They want to develop a ministry to the students, but are not sure how to go about it.

One day Bill decides to go there. He walks in with no shoes, jeans, his t-shirt, and wild hair. The service is already started, and so Bill starts down the aisle looking for a seat. The church is completely packed, and he can't find a seat. By now people are really looking a bit uncomfortable, but no one says anything.

Bill gets closer and closer and closer

are no seats he just sits down, right on the carpet. (Although perfectly acceptable behavior in a college fellowship, trust me, this had never happened in this church before.) By now the people are really uptight and the tension in the air is thick.

About this time the minister realizes that from way at the back of the church a deacon is slowly making his way toward Bill.

Now the deacon is in his 80s and has silver-gray hair and wears a three-piece suit. He is a godly man, very elegant, very dignified, very courtly. He walks with a cane, and as he starts walking towards this boy everyone is saying to themselves that you can't blame him for what he is going to do. How can you expect a man of his age and of his background to understand some college kid on the floor?

It takes a long time for the man to reach the boy. It is utterly silent except for the clicking of the man's cane. All eyes are focused on him. You can't even hear anyone breathing. The minister can't even preach the sermon until the deacon does what he has to do.

And now they see this elderly man drop his cane on the floor With great difficulty he lowers himself and sits down next to Bill and worships with him so he won't be alone.

Everyone chokes up with emotion. When the minister gains control. He says "What I'm about to preach, you'll never remember. What you have just seen, you will never forget. Be careful how you live. You may be the only Bible some people will ever read."


